Mining Memories: A Journey Through History at the Old Theater and Mining Museum 9/7 | 10am to 4pm

Alleghany is the home of the Original Sixteen to One Mine, one of the longest operating mines in the U.S. The town had a little boom in the 1930s during the great depression. The 1940 census recorded a population of around 500. By 1970 that figure was 125 and the last two census' (2020 and 2010) recorded around 60 people. Pack a lunch, visit the museum and old theater. The old theater and school gym is rarely open to the public.

Behind the Curtain: Exploring the Hidden Charms of the Old Community Theater 9/7 | 11am to 4pm

Alleghany is the home of the Original Sixteen to One Mine, one of the longest operating mines in the U.S. The town had a little boom in the 1930s during the great depression. The 1940 census recorded a population of around 500. By 1970 that figure was 125 and the last two census' (2020 and 2010) recorded around 60 people. Pack a lunch, visit the museum, old community theater and historical cemetery. The theater is not usually open to the public, but will be for this event.

Golden Rhythms: Dance Through Time at Forest City's Historic Dance Hall 9/7 | 12pm to 4pm

Forest City is a National Register Historic District located in Sierra County. At 4,600 feet elevation, its mines were located on the Great Blue Lead, with highest population and mining activity between 1850-1880. Now, it is almost a ghost town. The Forest City Historical Association manages the Dance Hall, the last remaining large commercial structure, in authentic state, along with photo displays and a museum area. A self-guided walking tour is available to view the historic district.

Kentucky Mine: Delve into History on a Historic Tour

9/7 | 10am to 4pm

Located on highway 49 in the historic gold mining town of Sierra City, the Kentucky Mine Museum is a real treasure. Tours take visitors from the entrance of the gold mine with its blacksmith shop, into a miners' cabin, and on through the well-preserved stamp mill. By the end of the tour, guests will understand from beginning to end the workings of a California stamp mill.





The Kentucky Consolidated Gold Mining Company was formed in 1853 and was expanded to ten stamps in 1888. The mine was abandoned during the turn-of-the century and reopened by Emil Loeffler and his son Adolph. The Loefflers rebuilt the mill on the current site during the 1920s, reusing salvaged equipment from local mines from this early period. The mill was equipped with two water-powered Pelton wheels that turned belts and two 5-battery stamps in crushing ore to particles fine enough to pass through fine screens and onto the amalgamation shaker tables. Adolph Loeffler died tragically in a mine explosion in 1944; however, the family worked the ore up until 1953. In 1974, the mill was transferred to the Sierra County Historical Society to serve as stewards.

Today the park displays old mining equipment on the grounds and its museum exhibits let visitors glimpse into Sierra County's rich history. Come visit the Kentucky Mine Museum to step into the past!

Learn about the dreams and challenges of the Herr Family and Marguerite Wildenhain, the first woman master potter to graduate from the Bauhaus. Pond Farm was Marguerite's home, school and studio for over 30 years and she taught hundreds of her students in the traditions of the Bauhaus.

A Haven of Hope: The Disability History of Sonoma Developmental Center 9/7 | 9:30am to 11:30am

Sonoma Developmental Center, nestled on 1,110 acres of wild land, is home to nearly 100 historic buildings, flowing creeks, serene lakes, an orchard, and a memorial cemetery. Founded in 1884 by Frances Bentley and Julia Judah as a haven for children with developmental disabilities, the Center grew to serve adults, providing residential care, schooling, and practical training.

In its early years, residents contributed to the community, working on construction, cooking, and farming. The

Center became a vital part of the county's economy, and its legacy includes connections to historic figures like Luther Burbank and Jack London. Closed in 2018, the site now stands as a poignant reminder of its 130-year history. Join us to explore the rich and enduring story of this remarkable institution.

Homesteading History: Exploring 1869 at Hagemann Ranch 9/7 to 9/8 | 10am to 4pm

This is the 5 acre homestead from an original 500 acre horse ranch. Almost all buildings are original to our period of significance, 1869 to 1930. Horses, chickens, bees and goats are still housed on the site (managed by 4H), and there is an agricultural acre managed for special needs adults by Sunflower Hill, available for self-guided touring. The buildings are in various states of preservation and restoration. Structural/architectural tour of the house reveals chronology of minimalist farm construction methods. Site tours include the granary, blacksmith shop and large barns. Reconstructed bundle wagon and freight wagon are shown with other farm implements and restored tractors. Visitors are free to roam or join





our organized tours. This site is owned by the City of Livermore, operated by the Livermore Heritage Guild, Livermore's historical society.

Cohen Bray House: Victorian Gems and the Legacy of Gold Rush Families

Come visit this 1/2 acre hidden gem, the Cohen Bray house and property are all thats left of the original 200 acres of the Oak Tree Farm Estate in the Fruitvale district of Oakland CA. once owned by W. A. Bray 1862-1885. Built from 1882-1884 as a wedding present for Bray's eldest daughter Emma Bray and her new husband Alfred Henry Cohen. Alfred Henry's father, A.A. Cohen, (the chief attorney for the Central Pacific railroad) not to be out done, furnished the house in the high aesthetic style of the period.

Not much has changed in the front interiors of the house since 1885, big changes caused by the 1906 earthquake, required the back rooms of the house to be rebuilt in the craftsman style. Since 2021, we have restored some of the private areas (kitchen and butlers pantry) and opened them up to tours.

Feb. 28th, 2024, we celebrated 140 years of restoring and preserving this house and its collections. Five generations of family has lived here. In 1989, Family created a 501c3 non profit -The Victorian Preservation Center of Oakland, to continue the goals of education and outreach to the community and educational institutions. Family are involved and lead the tours. The house is on the National Register of Historic Places in Alameda County as the "Alfred H Cohen House". We are an Oakland Landmark #8.

Treasure Island's Timeless Splendor: Discover the 1939 Art Deco World's Fair Building

9/7 | 10am to 4pm

Come visit Treasure Island's fabulous Art Moderne air terminal, listed on the National Register. Since 1975 the lobby of of this building has been home to the Treasure Island Museum, with exhibits and models showing and telling the island's dynamic history and projection into the future. Our building was constructed in 1937/38 to accommodate Pan American Airways and its passengers during the years of the Clipper flights across the Pacific (1938-1945), and to serve as the Administration Building for the Golden Gate International Exposition, 1939-1940. Treasure Island (1942-1997) became a major naval station during World War II and subsequent Navy and Marine engagements in the Pacific. Now the building is headquarters to the Treasure



Island Development Group, in charge of the new redevelopment on the island as its ownership is transferred from the Navy to the City of San Francisco. For Doors Open California 2024, we will offer tours of the building and of other "secret places" on the island! We will provide visitors with a guide for a walking or driving tour of the island's historic and current highlights. Come learn about San Francisco's best kept secret!

Angel Island Immigration Station: Guided Stories of Hope and Heritage

The site is designated as both a California Historical Landmark and a National Historic Landmark. The tour will include part of the outdoor exhibits on the site, the Detention Barracks Museum, and the Angel Island Immigration Museum that recently opened in 2022 in the site's former hospital building. The tour will be co-led by staff from Angel Island State Park and Angel Island Immigration Station Foundation. Visitors will learn about the history of exclusionary immigration policies, differential treatment, and immigrant stories connected to the site.

Timeless Treasures: Restored Pilot Houses and Maritime Tales

9/7 to 9/8 | 10 to 5

Galilee Harbor is a live aboard marina for 38 low income families on Sausalito's waterfront. Our docks are open to the public, inviting all to see how families of artists and maritime service workers live in this unique 1960s style co-op. You will be greeted by colorful hand painted mailboxes, our community garden, and a wide array of vessels which serve as full time residences, including a few built from WWII life boats and a 1930s kitchen barge.

Our restored twin pilot houses were rescued from the 1914 ferry boat Issaquah during her demolition. Today, these tiny buildings serve as mini-museums with artifacts and informational plaques seen through the windows. Overlooking the restored wetland marsh, you'll see a muddy island where, at low tide, you'll still spot some of the the pilings that cradled the brigantine Galilee. The notable 130-foot ship was launched by



Benecia shipyard builder Matthew Turner in 1891, after which it broke speed records ferrying mail and cargo between San Francisco and Tahiti. Later in life she charted Earth's magnetic fields for the Carnegie Institute, and served as an Alaskan fishing boat before ultimately becoming one of Sausalito's earliest houseboats. Galilee is physically gone, but her spirit of adventure lives on in her namesake floating community.


Cabrillo National Monument: Journey Through Time and Nature

Julia Morgan's Legacy: Behind the Doors of the Berkeley City Club

9/15 | 10am to 4pm

Berkeley City Club docents will introduce you to Miss Morgan, who was the first woman architect certified by the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris, and will lead you through the vaulted halls and arcaded courtyards of this medieval fantasy.

The Berkeley City Club is known for its steel-reinforced concrete walls and ceilings (artfully fashioned to look like wood), leaded glass windows, interior courtyards and magnificent indoor swimming pool. The building is a blend of Romanesque and Moorish styles of architecture common to the areas surrounding the Mediterranean Sea.

Julia Morgan's engineering skills, evident in the seismically solid building exterior, were matched by her attention to the interior designs for furniture, light fixtures, distinctive fireplaces and even dishes.



Constructed in 11 months, this six-story landmarked building opened in 1930 as the " Berkeley Women ' City Club " with a membership of over 4,000.

The Club's founding group of women, all involved in separate civic, social, athletic and philanthropic causes, wanted to come together in a single, impressive, multi-use building. At the height of her career, Bay Area architect Julia Morgan was the natural choice for their project.

Originally a social club and residence for women, the Berkeley City Club has welcomed both women and men since 1962. Today it serves as a club, hotel, restaurant, events space and conference center.

Beverly Hills Unveiled: Behind-the-Scenes of Cultural Landmarks

9/14 | 10am to 3pm

Explore a captivating journey through some of Beverly Hills' iconic cultural and historic landmarks, expertly guided by the City's Urban Designer, cultural heritage consultant, and historic preservation team. The behind-the-scenes tour will showcase the elegant Beverly Hills City Hall, Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts (formerly the City of Beverly Hills Post Office), and the timeless allure of the City's historic landmarks in the "Golden Triangle", including a special visit to Frank Lloyd Wright's Anderton Court Shops (recently restored and new home to world renowned retailer -- Givenchy). The tour will conclude with a visit to historic Beverly Gardens Park to bask in the charm of the iconic Lily Pond. Participants will gain a unique perspective on the rich tapestry of Beverly Hills' history and the profound influence these sites have wielded in shaping the City's illustrious prominence.

El Campo Santo Cemetery: Walking Among Legends 9/14 to 9/15 | 12pm to 4pm

Don Pio Pico (1801-1894) lived most of the 19th century and saw in his long lifetime astonishing changes in California and Los Angeles from the Spanish era to the Gilded Age. A merchant, landowner and member of the legislature, Pico was the last governor of the Mexican era as well as a capitalist who built structures in Los Angeles during its first boom in the late 1860s and early 1870s, including the still-standing Pico House hotel. Financial troubles, a raft of lawsuits and a swindle plagued his later years and he was evicted from his suburban ranch and died, seen as something of a relic of pre-American California at the Los Angeles home of a daughter. In 1921, his descendants agreed to move the remains of the exgovernor and his wife Maria Ignacia Alvarado, sister of another governor, to a newly completed mausoleum in El Campo Santo at what is now the Workman and Temple Family Homestead Museum in the City of Industry. A PowerPoint-



illustrated talk about Pico and the Cemetery and a visit to the burial ground and the Pico crypt comprises the program, and visitors are encouraged to separately visit our historic houses: the Workman House and La Casa Nueva. NOTE: Tours for this program are hourly at Noon, 1, 2 and 3 p.m.

Visit Los Angeles Union Station as it celebrates 85 years. Enjoy behind-the-scenes "hidden gems" including the Ticket Concourse and the former Fred Harvey Restaurant.



Completed in 1939, Los Angeles Union Station is widely regarded as "the last of the great train stations." The Station was designed by the father-and-son architect team of John and Donald Parkinson with an innovative blend of Spanish Colonial, Mission Revival and Art Deco architecture now commonly referred to as Mission Moderne.

Attendees will visit the Ticket Concourse with its glazed bronze doors and 110-foot-long ticket counter made of American black walnut. Suspended 10 feet above are six bronze chandeliers designed by Phoenix Day. The surrounding wainscot is composed of geometric tiles created by Gladding McBean. Next up, the former Fred Harvey Restaurant, designed by Mary Colter, known for her distinctive Southwestern design. Her style can be seen in the floor design with inlaid cement tile replicating a Navajo blanket.

Union Station was designated Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument No. 101 in 1972 and listed in the National Register of Historic Places and California Register of Historical Resources in 1980.



This tour is led by the Los Angeles Conservancy, a nonprofit membership organization whose mission is to work through education and advocacy to recognize, preserve, and revitalize the historic, architectural, and cultural resources of Los Angeles County. Union Station is one of the Conservancy's award-winning weekly historic tours of downtown Los Angeles.

Neutra Reunion House: Special Access to Architectural Brilliance 9/14 | 10am to 3pm

Attendees will learn about the history of this multi-generational design for a house by Richard J. Neutra, master architect, from 1951. After the fire at the nearby VDL House, Richard, Dione, and Dion purchased the house. Dione eventually sold it to Dion who lived there until his passing in 2019. House is in original condition with personal items of Dion Neutra. Reunion House features all the classic character-defining features of the Mid-Century Modern style. It also features many of Neutra's most essential design elements including floor-to-ceiling glass doors, mitered glass windows, spider-legs, clerestory windows, water feature, etc.

Nirvana's Restored Lobby: Hollywood Glamour Returns 9/14 to 9/15 | 10am to 4pm

The incredible transformation of the 1925 lobby of the Nirvana apartment building.

Once richly adorned with wall paintings and plaster reliefs, the lobby's walls were overpainted in white and red around the 60's. The recently completed restoration process included both the uncovering and the restoration of all the murals. The facade is also very interesting, it features a pagoda roof and original copper dragons gargoyles among other incredible details. I was the lead conservator on the project and I will be there explaining to visitors both the history of the building and the restoration process.

Venice High School Auditorium: Showcasing Local Talent and History 9/14 to 9/15 | 11am to 3pm

The Venice High School Auditorium was constructed in 1937 and is a contributing feature to the Venice High School Historic District eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places and the California Register of Historical Resources. The campus is significant for its association with the School District's efforts to rebuild following the Long Beach earthquake in 1933 and is an excellent example of the PWA Moderne architectural style prevalent throughout the School District at the time. The Auditorium features two frescoes by Helen Lundeberg completed in 1941. In 2023, LAUSD completed a renovation project including repairs to ornamental plaster features in the interior and upgrades for seismic stability. This project was recently awarded a California Preservation Foundation Design Award.







Mariners Medical Arts: Discovering Neutra's Healing Spaces

9/15 | 9am to 10am

Reacting to the intimidating clinic design of his day, premier midcentury architect Richard Neutra created an entirely new architectural approach to the medical office. Light and access to nature were balanced by a need for patients' privacy and sense of calm. These concepts became fundamental to his philosophy about the role of architecture in facilitating the 'art' of medicine.

In Newport Beach, California, Richard Neutra's **Mariners Medical Arts** building expertly couples health and design by treating outdoor spaces as an extension of its interior. The 2023 renovation to the midcentury building, led by developers Burnham-Ward Properties and architecture firm Shubin Donaldson, restored several significant components, among these three water features removed from the site in the 1970s. Burnham-Ward Properties' team relied on historic photographs and preserved construction drawings to restore many key elements of Neutra's original design intent.

Join Burnham-Ward Properties Partner Steve Thorp for a guided tour of the 20,000-square-foot property and hear firsthand how the team approached restoring and preserving this iconic 1963 Neutra site while adapting it for generations to come.

Malaga Cove Library: Historical Wonders in Palos Verdes 9/14 | 10am to 4:30pm

The Malaga Cove Library, a Myron Hunt building built in 1929, is the oldest of our facilities and is on the National Register of Historic Places. The adjoining garden is also an Olmsted Associates garden as is the park and fountain directly next to the library. Visitors can see the historic building which served as the community center during the early development of the Palos Verdes peninsula through self-guided and staff-led tours. Malaga Cove Plaza, one street over from the Library was registered on the National Register of Historic Places several years ago and features architecture and development according to plans laid out by the Palos Verdes Project in the 1920s and would be a compliment area to the library facility.



The White Point Nature Education Center is located on a beautifully restored 102-acre nature preserve where visitors can enjoy historical structures and sites as well as scenic trails through restored natural habitats. This historic town has a rich history and much to offer. Besides its fascinating filmmaking legacy, it would have been important in history books anyway due to the significant CA Nursery that amongst its many accomplishments supplied trees for the Avenue of the Palms at the SF World's Fair in 1915 and foliage for the 1939 Treasure Island World's Fair. Niles could also boast its brickyard, cannery, decorative tile factory and a whole lot more. It served as a train hub with 24 iron horses passing through each day. But there also were the movies! More than 350 one and two reel films cranked out in a four-year period that featured the picturesque Niles canyon and the first cowboy movie star "Broncho Billy" Anderson and Charlie Chaplin!

Wear some shoes you can move about in and find out what happened here more than one hundred years ago. Important landmarks will be discussed and stories will be shared! Meet at the museum and bring your camera. Includes your own copy of our museum Walking Tour of Niles booklet.



The Niles Essanay Silent Film Museum is open for tours Saturdays and Sundays from 12:00 - 4:00 pm so after the walking tour has concluded, you are welcome to visit the museum which also includes the Edison Theater.

Shinn Ranch: From Baby Observations to Chinese Bunkhouse Tales

9/15 | 1pm to 4pm

Babies and Bunkhouses: What do they tell us about life on the historic Shinn Ranch?



Dr. Milicent Shinn's child development studies were carried out at the Shinn ranch. Her observations of her niece were the basis of her PhD dissertation (1898) and later book, The Biography of a Baby (1900). Her later study notebooks (1906-1912) recorded her observations of her nephew Joseph Jr. In addition to observations about Joseph Jr.'s language development and motor milestones, Dr. Shinn also recorded wonderful snippets of family life and their Chinese workers in the house and on the ranch. Joseph Jr's two favorite people were Grandma Lucy and their Chinese cook, Fong Gan - perhaps because they both supplied him with sweet treats? The gardens are captured in words, as little Joseph Jr. explores his world.

The "Chinese bunkhouse" is a the last fragile 100-year-old bunkhouse from the Shinn ranch "China Camp." When restored, the building will be used to highlight the historic role of the Chinese immigrants at the Shinn ranch and in our community. This history is recorded in the letters, ledgers, and photos of the Shinn House Museum and other archives. The building is included in the working nomination of the Shinn Ranch to the National Register of Historic Places.



The Shinn House Museum, at the back of the Shinn House, is open 1-4 pm. The Chinese Bunkhouse Preservation group will be on hand from 1-4 with the exhibit "Chinese Roots: Sketches of Life in the Washington Township." The regular tours of the two story 1876 Shinn House are 1-4 pm first come first serve, for the donation of \$4 adult \$2 child. Please bring cash.

Location: Shinn Historical Park & Arboretum, 1251 Peralta Avenue, Fremont CA. Parking is free.



Ketchum's Barn: Museums and Archives of Pacific Grove's Heritage

The Heritage Society of Pacific Grove is a nonprofit organization formed in 1975 to foster an appreciation of the city's historical and architectural resources through preservation activities and public education. The Barn, fondly known as "Ketcham's Barn," was built in 1891 by H. C. Ketcham, who used it to house animals. Hay and other provisions were stored in the loft.





The property was purchased by the City of Pacific Grove in 1979 and is now leased to the Heritage Society to store historical documents and displays of local interest, including a Victorian bay window and replica tent from the Chautauqua era. The Society also maintains the adjacent lot with a wishing well, benches, and garden plantings.

Sacramento Valley Station: Rooftop Views and Railyard Insights 9/21 to 9/22 |

The City of Sacramento completed an extensive renovation of the Sacramento Valley Station in 2017. The station has 4 spaces deemed to be significant under the NHR. One of those spaces is the second floor corridor which was faithfully restored in our rehabilitation but is only accessible to lease tenants, on a daily basis. This floor also contains the original vault door. The third floor added an exterior 1,200 sf roof deck that is also not available to the public at this time. Both of these spaces would be on the tour, along with a large space that contains many salvage items from the restoration, as well as a tour of the Main Waiting Room and other areas on the ground floor which can be described by guided tour. Points of the restoration, the creative use of the historic elements for sustainable energy design (eg. Storm Windows, radiant floor heat/cool under 6,000 sf marble floor, and recirculating stratified warm air through the Main Waiting Room chandelier medallions, and facts on the restoration of the historic mural, to name a few.



Blinn House: Behind-the-Scenes of Historical Elegance

Join us as for a behind-the-scenes tour of the 1906 Blinn House, formerly the Women's City Club of Pasadena. Named for its original owners, Edmund and Kate Blinn, the Blinn House was designed by George Washington Maher, a prominent Chicago architect. The Prairie-style home is the only known Maher residence



on west of the Mississippi. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as well as the California Register of Historical Resources, and it is a City of Pasadena landmark. In 1945, the Women's City Club of Pasadena acquired the home and it was used as a clubhouse until the Club's dissolution in 2020. Pasadena Heritage, a nonprofit organization that promotes historic preservation through advocacy and education, is the new steward of this historic landmark. We welcome the public to tour the house with our experienced docents and explore some areas not open to the public on the second and third floors. The Blinn House is located in the Ford Place Historic District, which was nominated by the City of Pasadena to the National Register of Historic Places in 2010. Ford Place was developed between 1902 and 1916 as an exclusive upscale residential neighborhood. Tour guests will receive a self-guided walking tour brochure of this historic neighborhood, which is now home to Fuller Theological Seminary.



Please note the first floor of the Blinn House does have wheelchair access and is accessible via the Hunt Room ramp. Sauer-Adams Adobe and Tilhini Aqueduct: Gardens and Historic Waterways

9/28 | 12pm to 5pm

The Sauer-Adams Adobe is the oldest inhabited building in San Luis Obispo County, consisting of two Indian slave adobes from 1801–1810, a rare adobe second floor added in the 1860s, and redwood cladding and full-length front balcony in the Greek Revival style from the 1870s. The property was granted to





lawman Victor Linares, father of notorious outlaw Pio Linares, during the Mexican era. From 1860, when it was bought by the immigrant German Sauer family, it has served as a hotel, rooming house, and apartment house. During Prohibition it fronted the wine-making operations of Victoria Duchi, who later moved to San Francisco to open an establishment called Dance Your Ass Off. The Adams/Gough family has owned and cared for the adobe since 1940.

Historian and Sauer-Adams resident James Papp will give tours of the adobe, garden, and neighboring Chumash-built aqueduct every half hour on the hour and half hour between noon and 5 pm.

Dallidet Adobe, State Historical Landmark #720, is unique among adobes on the Central Coast of California. It has had only two owners. Built in the 1850s by Pierre Hypolite Dallidet, it was home to Pierre, wife Ascencion Concepcion Salazar and family for over 100 years.
